SUPREME Star Council Incentive

To motivate councils to reach their Star goal, Supreme is again offering \$4.50/member as of 7/1/2016 and 10,000 VIP points. In the alphabetized table below, you can find your council and the amount of money you will receive as a credit to your account if you make Star Council. This is worth hundreds and for some councils, a thousand or more. BE CAREFUL. Removing members and not making Star Council can cost a council lots of money.


IDAHO December Drive

To help your council reach its goal, Idaho will credit your account for each recruit. The amount credited equals whatever Supreme awards the state for reaching its recruiting percentage divided by the number of Idaho December recruits. Additionally, Idaho will waive the \$10 ceremonial fee. If we work together and reach 11% (31 statewide) the award to participating councils would be \$34/recruit.

The Arrival

The move to Guam actually started several years earlier, when my wife, who is a native of Guam, told me that a cousin was selling a piece of property in Guam which was right next door to her brother's land. I had been to Guam enough times by then to have fallen in love with the island and its people and the timing was right for us to take advantage of this opportunity. The property had a concrete house which, though in severe disrepair, was structurally sound. After several years of four-month visits and considerable support from my brother-in-law and Home Depot (yeah, they have one here.), the house was ready and we decided to make the move. It took an additional two-plus years to detach from Idaho, but after saying so long to our friends and family and my Brother Knights in Council 1663, it was finally time to board the plane.

They say to be careful what you wish for. One of mine was to not take over 30 hours to get to Guam. Well, this time the flight schedule had us go from Albany, New York to Chicago, then Honolulu, then Guam with only enough time to dash from one flight to the next. After 24 hours, 20 of which in the air, we went from mid-Autumn in New York to warm tropical sea air so quickly I still had my Knights of Columbus windbreaker on going through customs. After being 30 hours out of bed with only snatches of airplane napping, we both moved toward the terminal entrance like a tryout for the "walking dead".

Antonio Won Pat International Airport sits on a 200-foot plateau above the crescent-shaped expanse of Tumon Bay on the Philippine Sea. Stepping out of the terminal, one has a vista of the perfect curve of the Bay, dotted with the tops of the luxury hotels that earned this beach the moniker "the Paris of the Pacific" as the top honeymoon destination in East Asia; the orange tile of the Guam Hilton, the twin towers of the Pacific Islands Club, and the 20 story sail-shaped Weston, standing like a giant surfboard stuck in the sand. Beyond lies the deep blue of the ocean stretching toward the light blue horizon, dotted with clouds. I know that I said to myself what everyone who has ever stepped out of those doors has said; "This...is paradise!"

All Hallows Eve

We live in the village of Mangilao and our church is Santa Teresita, a wide, airy, pastel space with a spacious alter and tall windows reaching up to a high white ceiling. It has a choir full of beautiful voices and Capuchin Monk parish priest who ad libs little improvements on the Eucharistic prayers. When we went to mass on all Hallows Eve, we found out the Youth Group had been in an all-day retreat preparing for this Feast Day. As we sat waiting for Mass, a group of teens in white robes stepped upon the alter and performed an interpretive dance to a hymn which the children had been practicing that day, ending with the entire Youth group singing and dancing along in their section of pews next to the altar. As I looked around me, I saw dozens of children of various ages dressed in biblical-looking costumes and I realized that they were dressed as their favorite saints for All Saints Day. After Mass, all the children went out to the church parking lot to "Trunk-or-treat". It occurred to me that this is the way Halloween should be celebrated.

All Souls Day

If the children had celebrated the true spirit of Halloween the night before, the adults really got it right the next day. Guam has been Catholic since Blessed Diego Luis de San Vitores brought the message of Christ to the Marianas in the fourteenth century. Chamorros (the natives of Guam and the Marianas) are especially devoted to family and All Souls Day is a day of reverence to the departed. Families descend on the cemeteries to tend the graves, pay respects, and pray for the deceased. Outdoor Masses are celebrated in all cemeteries, with the biggest in Guam Memorial Park. My wife and I joined her family at GMP to celebrate this day with what must have been thousands of others. I now know that I'm in a place where faith and family are interwoven with daily life. I believe I'm going to like it here.


Free Throw Championship Planning Time

May our Great God continue to Bless and Keep each of you!!





NAZARETH WALKING ROSARY RENOVATION

On September 26, 2015, Fr. Reggie Nwauzor officiated at the blessing of the recently renovated Walking Rosary on the grounds of Nazareth Retreat Center in Boise. This event was the culmination of the dream of William Sandrus, the original designer of the Walking Rosary, in honor of Our Blessed Mother, thirty plus years ago. Family, friends and the area Knights of Columbus members attended the special ceremony.

Background

Approximately 30 years ago, William Sandrus and the Boise/Sacred Heart Council (#00899), created a walking rosary at the Nazareth Retreat Center on Five Mile Road in Boise, Idaho. In the early 2000s, Bill desired to restore and renovate the area making the Walking Rosary more handicap friendly. Discussions were held at Risen Christ Council (#12854); however, the work was not started. On 7/16/2010, Bill passed away and designated funds (approx. \$6,200) for this project. Additionally, Nazareth Retreat Center collected approx. \$750 in memorials for this activity in Brother Sandrus' and mother-in-law, Lenora Varitek's, (Mountain Home, Idaho) name. Also, over the project duration, funds were donated by the Knights of Columbus Nampa, St. Mark's and Holy Spirit Councils. During the next few years, several Knights and landscape entities planned to complete Bill's dream. In March/April, 2013, Dave Palumbo and the Risen Christ Knights of Columbus Council, volunteered to organize the renovation of the walking rosary.



Project Activity

Dave Palumbo met with Fred DiLorenzo, Director of the Retreat Center and William's widow, Julia Sandrus, to determine the scope of work. The plan was to remove the existing pavers that made up the rosary, relocate several benches to the new location of the mystery pavers, dig a 3' x 6" x 300' path located by Fred, compact in the path 3/4" road mix, place weed barrier in the trench, place 3/4" sienna stone in the path, place the pavers in the new path, mark each mystery/Our Father with a stone monument detailing four mysteries, and planting roses at each mystery site. There are eight wood/metal benches at or near the walking rosary. Four benches are to be relocated and the wood seats/backs are to be replaced with composite material to drastically reduce future maintenance.

The first phase of the project began as Dave Palumbo measured the site and sourced the purchase of the road mix, sienna stone, and weed barrier. New pavers were located to replace broken ones and enlarge the mystery site pavers. A compactor was reserved. KC members provided a sod cutter and rototiller. The gravel, stone, and pavers were delivered the day prior to the event. Julia Sandrus and her sisters brought donuts for the work crew. The work time for this phase of the project was essentially from 8 am to 5 pm with an hour lunch break provided by Nazareth. The cost for this portion of the project was \$1,994.64. Twenty-one Knights, family and friends provided 148 total hours in this phase.

The second phase of the project was the completion of replacing the wooden material of seven benches with composite material, painting the metal elements of the benches and placing landscape rock under one bench (which was not completed during Phase I). Knights and friends worked 52 hours of combined time on this phase. The cost of the second phase of this project total \$1,603.20.

The third phase of the project was to purchase and place five monuments inscribed with the four mysteries of the Rosary. Rockitecture Stoneworks in Garden City was contacted and provided a suggested monument, price to manufacture and placement of monuments. Julia Sandrus and Fred DiLorenzo were contacted and approved the monument design. Total cost of the monument phase was \$3,006. Knights, family and friends spent twenty hours combined time preparing the site and placing the monuments. A second element of this phase was to purchase rose plants to be placed near each monument. Dave and Kathy Palumbo and Julia Sandrus completed the planting of the roses and clean-up of the area for the Blessing Ceremony in June and September for a total 33 hours of combined time. Three roses in colors of red and white (total 18) were planted at each mystery monument and crucifix area at a cost less than \$100.



The completed project is truly a beautiful tribute to Our Blessed Mother and allows an area of quiet sanctuary for meditation and prayer.


Assembly Actions


