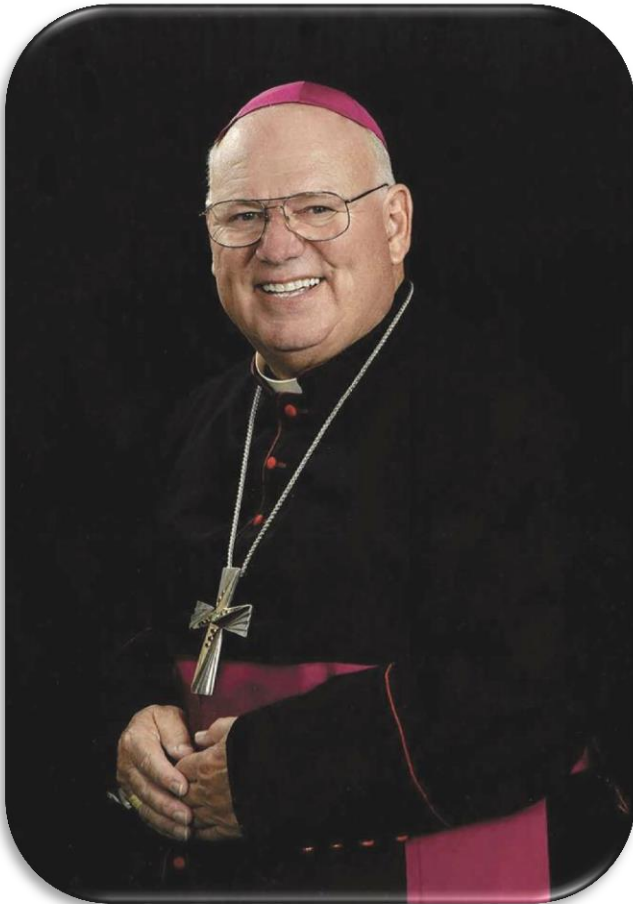

### *Eternal Rest Grant unto Him*

The Mass of Christian Burial for the Most Rev. Michael P. Driscoll, bishop of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Boise from 1999 to 2014, will be celebrated on Thursday, Nov. 2, 2017, at 10 a.m. at the Cathedral of St. John the Evangelist in Boise.

A Vigil with Rite of Reception of the Body is set for 7 p.m. on Wednesday, Nov. 1, 2017, at the Cathedral. Following the Vigil, Bishop Driscoll's body will lie in state in the Cathedral until shortly before the funeral Mass. The cathedral will be open all night for those wanting to pay their respects.

Bishop *Driscoll* died on Tuesday, October 24, 2017 of natural causes in Boise at age 78.

Bishop Peter F. Christensen, the current Bishop of the Diocese of Boise, will preside at the Vigil and Rite of Reception of the Body. Archbishop Alexander K. Sample of the Archdiocese of Portland will preside at the funeral Mass on Thursday.

A Rite of Committal will take place at Morris Hill Cemetery immediately following the funeral Mass.

## Building the Domestic Church while Strengthening our Parish

"Fatherhood is being present" is the title of an article in the September - October Idaho Catholic Register. The article is written by Julie Robinson and Tony Quilici, Boise's St. Joseph's Elementary School communications director and the school's principle, respectively. Their article details St. Joseph's beginning of the school year Mass. St. Joseph's invited dads and other father figures to participate in the Mass and about 120 men gathered for the event. Fathers, grandfathers, godfathers, and father figures from the community participated. Clearly these men answered the call to be Disciples of Christ. As the authors point out, these men took time from their day to participate with the school in developing the students' faith. One father was quoted as saying, "It was an honor being there in such great company. Fatherhood is being present". What a great example of Building the Domestic Church! The example set by the men of St. Joseph's flows directly into the November theme in The Family Fully Alive booklet: the Communion of Saints. Like the Church herself, the domestic church is called to be a communion of saints and our response to the call to holiness is important if we are to become the family God wants us to be. We may think of saints as people who lived long ago or are far removed from our everyday experiences but saints are close at hand, and God wants to make each of us a saint. Each member of the family has the task of helping others to grow in holiness through faith, hope and love. The men at St. Joseph's Catholic School's first Mass of the year demonstrates that saints can be very close at hand indeed.

I encourage everyone to take the time and read the article in the Idaho Catholic Register. Give serious consideration to thinking that Fatherhood is being present. As we approach the Christmas season there will be ample opportunities for you to be present. Christmas is a wonderful time for family and parish activities and Keeping Christ in Christmas. It follows that this is a great time to introduce some of the Domestic Church activities to your families and parishes. Any of the Keep Christ in Christmas programs listed will receive credit towards the Domestic Church requirement. There you will find information on Journey to the Inn and the Christmas Poster Contest. On that page you will find other ideas on activities related to Keeping Christ in Christmas. By the way *Journey to the Inn* is a great way to incorporate a live re-enactment of the travels of the Holy Family, whether within the church or outside. This would be ideal if you are getting the parish school or religious education classes involved in the events.

Remember always that Fatherhood is being present.

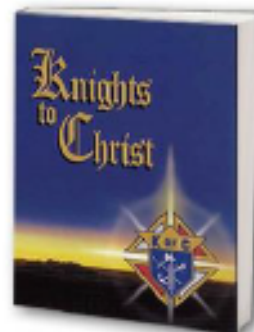

Those of us who sat through Sociology 101 were taught the more basic the need the higher the priority in our lives. Food, shelter, clothing... Once these needs are met, we begin to think about ideas like our faith.

So we strongly encourage you to support the Thanksgivings meal effort. If your parish does not have a Thanksgiving meal program or is not associated with one, this is a prime opportunity to organize one. The parish can provide the council with a list of needy families. A neighboring program can provide the council with a list of contents for the meal. A local grocery store may provide boxes. Council members can hand out the boxes and a food list



after masses the next two weeks. Then the council can distribute the meals the Sunday before Thanksgiving. If you are unable to organize this year, start planning for next year.

This is truly a pro-life effort.



# Catholic Daughters are here for YOU!

Who are Catholic Daughters?

The Catholic Daughters of the Americas (CDA) was founded in Utica, New York in 1903 by John E. Carberry and several other Knights of Columbus members as a charitable, benevolent and patriotic sorority for Catholic ladies. They were originally called the National Order of the Daughters of Isabella, dedicated to the principles of "Unity and Charity." John Carberry acted as first Regent to the Daughters of Isabella until the Court was established.



By 1908 CDA had 90 courts, and had grown from a membership of less than 100 to more than 10,000. In 1921 the order changed its name from the Daughters of Isabella to the Catholic Daughters of the Americas. In 1925 the first court outside of the United States was established in Cuba. It was during this time that the Catholic Daughters separated from the Knight of Columbus, allowing it to become an independent organization. At this time also CDA was open to "all" Catholic Women 18 and older. It is one of the largest Catholic Women's organizations with Courts in 42 states across the country, and in Puerto Rico, Guam, the Virgin Islands, Mexico, Peru and Kenya. Our National Headquarters is located in New York City.

There is much more to the history and organization of CDA. For all who have internet go to Catholic Daughters of the Americas.com and you can learn so much more.

## Catholic Daughters in Idaho

At this time there are four Courts in all of Idaho; Cataldo Court #158 in Lewiston, celebrating over 100 years, St. Theresa of the Mountain Court # 1053 in Kellogg, Our Lady of Victory Court #1348 in Nampa, and Our Lady of the Lake Court #1447 in Coeur d'Alene.

Girls and young women ages 8-18 can join the Junior Catholic Daughters of the Americas (JCDA). Young college women can join Campus Courts at Universities where established.

The CDA supports our Churches, Communities and Seminarians, and other local and National Charities. Our "Circle of Love" ministries include, Spiritual Enhancement, Leadership, Family, Education, Youth/ JCDA, Quality of Life and Legislation.

Catholic Daughters is a very fun and caring group of women who enjoy each other socially as well as encourage spiritual growth. Together they share their faith, love of God and a distinctly feminine spirituality alluded to by Pope John Paul II when he spoke of the necessity of "feminine genius" in today's world.

We must continue to grow if we want to be successful and productive in our mission. If you are a caring and giving lady, 18 or older, willing to share your time and talent, we welcome you to join us in our mission of "Unity and Charity" as we strive to "make a difference" in a world struggling with immorality and uncertainty.

We have had a busy August and September here in North Idaho. Construction has started on St. Ann's Church and weather for the most part has been helpful to us. The minor grading, foundation construction and utility construction has been taking place. We are expecting the main Glu-lam beams to arrive Nov 1 and the builder is anticipated to be ready for them. We also received our first shipment of dimensional lumber from Idaho Forest Group, this was approximately \$35,000 of wood donated to the Church by them. They are working with the builder to provide all dimensional lumber for the project, valued around \$80,000. If you thought ending an innocent life was the best solution under these circumstances – In the first case, you have just killed John Wesley before he could become the famed evangelist from England. In the second case, you aborted Beethoven and deprived the world of some of our greatest musical compositions. In the third case, you gave up on Ethel Waters, the renowned black gospel singer. In the fourth case, the teenage girl is the Blessed Virgin Mary, and you have just declared the murder of our Savior, Jesus Christ. ~ Author unknown

He was an active member Idaho Falls Council 1663 and the George Keller Assembly #187 4th Degree holding offices and being a member of the Assembly Color Corps. 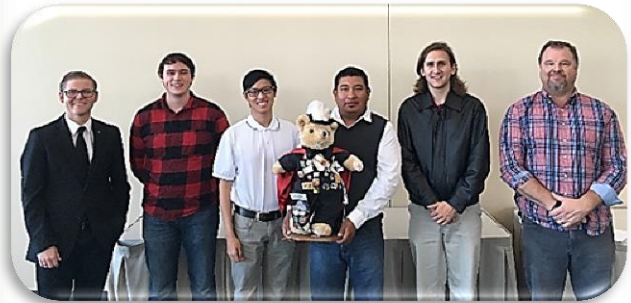


## Lewiston Council 1024

# **SPECIAL OLYMPICS CELEBRATES THEIR 50<sup>th</sup> ANNIVERSARY**

## **Idaho Regional Bowling Games**

Throughout history people with intellectual disabilities have suffered from the worst forms of abuse and discrimination – mostly invisible, hidden from view and ridiculed by society, and in some cases, their own families. The world felt more comfortable ignoring the most basic human needs – connection, health and hope for a better life – than acknowledging people with intellectual disabilities as neighbors, let alone as valuable members of society. But one woman altered the course of history and started a revolution to change it all and the Knights of Columbus were there.

When Eunice Kennedy Shriver founded Special Olympics in 1968 with the assistance of her husband, Sir Knight Sergeant Shriver, she took a rebellious stand against the injustices faced by people with intellectual disabilities. No longer would the world turn its back on the most vulnerable among us. Her solution was simple: give people with intellectual disabilities a chance to demonstrate their abilities, determination and value through sport. She faced seemingly insurmountable obstacles and yet never wavered in her steadfast belief that every person deserves to be treated with respect and have an opportunity to be included. Fifty years later, Special Olympics has grown from a summer camp held in Mrs. Shriver's backyard to a global movement reaching more than five million individuals with intellectual disabilities in 170 countries. The Knights of Columbus have been with them all the way. We were official sponsors of the 2015 World Games in Los Angeles.

Special Olympics Idaho and the State Knights of Columbus has played a vital role in this growth. For example, in 2009 the State hosted the Special Olympics World Winter Games. Idaho Knights provided volunteers to help put on that event, which brought athletes from all over the world to Idaho.

Idaho Knights of Columbus have continued their support by participating in events like the World Olympics Torch run which came through Idaho in June of 2015, providing volunteers for local and regional events and participating in fundraising activities. This November we can provide volunteers for the regional bowling games being held in Clarkston, Coeur de Alene, Nampa and Burley. District Deputies have been given the contact information for the individual Special Olympics Clubs in their area. ## Prospects Want to Talk to You — They're Just Busy

Finally, don't forget to:

- Make sure that your members are visible when conducting a charitable service project.
- Ask young men to join your council. Recruiting a wide range of age groups will provide your council greater reach within your community.
- Ask family, friends, co-workers and fellow parishioners if they would like to join your council.
- Always follow up with prospects in a timely manner, advising them of the date and time of the next First Degree exemplification.
